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I. Overview- Checklist after receiving your admission & enrollment letter

Searching for accommodation (after admission)

- You can apply for a dormitory room even before completing your university enrollment as long as you have the university admission.

- *please note: there is no guarantee that you get a room offer even if you pay the registration fee*

Enroll at the University

- Pay the tuition fee through your German bank account
- Submit all required documents

Activate your StudIP account as mentioned in the welcome letter you received (after enrollment)

- Check the "Notice board" for room advertisements and second-hand items for sale, among other things.
- Review upcoming courses to prepare for them.

Log in to your Sogo email

- Always check it frequently. A lot of emails will not be notified on StudIP.

Searching for accommodation - Apply for a dorm

*the dormitories are not part of the university. They are handled by the "Studentenwerk".

Apply for a room in the dormitories as soon as possible.

- Here you can apply for a place in a student dorm. Please note that in the apartments, men and women live together but in separate bedrooms. Alternatively, you can ask for a list of private housing providers.
- Wir Quartier (provided by Studentenwerk) are dorms in exchange for help, but you will still get on a waiting list. More information and registration via [studentenwerk-osnabrueck.de](https://www.studentenwerk-osnabrueck.de)

Detailed steps:

1. Register link: <https://www.studentenwerk-osnabrueck.de/en/housing/online-application/application-form.html>
2. Choose language: English in the right corner.
3. Fill in the information:
 - Location of Uni: Osnabrueck
 - Desired rental property: depending on you, most common are option a & b.
 - Choose 3 places that you want to stay (Choose 3 options to have higher chance to get a room in dormitory)
 - Move-in date: choose the semester you want to move in, the date will be set automatically. (In case, you want a room within the current semester, choose: current semester and the date you are interested to move in)
 - Your personal information
 - Information about your course of study
 - Address (home): information about your home country address
 - Address (term time): fill your temporary/ friends'/. address or the address that you will stay at when you come to Germany before receiving the room
 - Attach a scan of your passport and certificate of enrollment (If this is not possible for whatever reason, please mail your certificate of enrollment to: wohnen@sw-os.de → also possible at a later date)
4. Enter the security code.
5. Agree with data privacy agreement and send. Don't forget take a screenshot of the Studentenwerk Bank account information for you to send the 10 euro application fee after that.
6. Send 10 euro to Studentenwerk Bank account information that you saved. Your application is only validated when Studentenwerk receives your payment. *Please note that the application fee does not mean a guaranteed room offer at the dorm!

7. After you register successfully, you will receive:

- An email to record the information you have submitted, immediately after your submission.
- An email that confirms that Studentenwerk has received your 10 euro application fee. This email will come later, maybe 1-3 working days.
- They'll put you on the waiting list for your chosen housing complex for your requested move-in date.
- If a room becomes available for the specified period, they'll send you an email containing further information and a tenancy agreement for signing.
- If no accommodation is available at that time, you'll remain on the waiting list for four weeks.
- If you're still interested in finding accommodation with Studentenwerk, you have to send an email to follow up with your registration to let them know before the four weeks are up. Otherwise they'll assume that your application is no longer valid (wohnen@sw-os.de).

Important things to note when dealing with the Studentenwerk:

- Keep an eye on your email, as the Studentenwerk will communicate with you through this channel. Check your inbox frequently.
- Be prepared to make a deposit before receiving your room. This is a common requirement (Deposit for a furnished room: 600EUR, less for an unfurnished room)
- Read all the terms and conditions carefully, and make sure to sign all required documents.
- Note that the rent includes operating fees such as heating, electricity, internet, and water.
- You need to schedule an appointment with Studentenwerk's janitor in charge of your complex to receive your room key. Keep in mind that they only work on weekdays until Friday noon time, and not on Saturdays and Sundays.

 - Tips: After you get your student account from the university, log in to Stud.IP (<https://studip.uni-osnabrueck.de/dispatch.php/start>) asap, then you can find people looking for roommates on the Blackboard.

6. AStA Bettenbörse/bed surfing - ONLY ACTIVE WHEN THE DEMAND IS HIGH
 - Offers an emergency spot on a couch/bed/mattress to stay for the first weeks while searching for an apartment (limited availability).
 - Only online before the start of each semester - ask the AStA if it’s currently available

Searching for accommodation - Tips

Temporary housing options:

- When you first arrive in Germany, you can contact your country's student associations in the city you're going to and ask if anyone can host you for a few nights.
- You can also consider renting a room on Airbnb or finding short-term rentals (Zwischenmiete). Note that these options may not allow you to register your residence (Anmeldung). If you choose Zwischenmiete, make sure to clarify the terms with the landlord.

Common types of accommodation for students:

- The most common type of accommodation for students in Germany is a single room (Einzelzimmer) in a Wohngemeinschaft (WG), which is a shared flat. In a WG, each tenant has a private room while sharing the kitchen and the bathroom. Some WGs may offer single rooms with private bathrooms. You can find WG listings online or consider renting an apartment with friends to form a WG. Student dormitories usually offer WG-style accommodations as well, along with other options like studio apartments or apartments for couples.

Challenging months for finding accommodation:

- The months of September, October, and November are particularly challenging for finding accommodation in Germany, especially in cities with a high student population. Many students start their studies during this period, and there is a high demand for WG-style housing.

When to start searching:

- If you haven't arrived in Germany yet, the chances of securing accommodation remotely are quite low. Renting in Germany often requires in-person visits and discussions with landlords or current tenants (common in WGs). It's advisable to prepare in advance.

Applying for waiting lists at student housing:

- Before arriving, you can apply to the waiting lists (Warteliste) of student dormitories without needing to prove your student status. Waiting times vary depending on the city, ranging from a few days to several months or even years.

Search for accommodation - Tips

Researching rental prices:

- Before you arrive, research rental prices in the city you're heading to. You can use websites like wg-gesucht, ebay kleinanzeigen, or immobilienscout to get an idea of the rental market.

Considering outskirts of the city:

- Living in the city center can be competitive. However, Germany's excellent public transportation network often extends to the outskirts. Use Google Maps to estimate commuting times from potential housing locations to the city center/university. Compare the prices of accommodations in different areas.

Writing a letter of interest (Anschreiben) for apartment viewings:

- Treat your apartment search like a job application. Write a letter of interest in German, similar to a cover letter. Introduce yourself, your studies, and your plans in Germany. Address specific requirements from the rental listing. Include your desired move-in date and contact information.

Viewing the apartment:

- Check nearby amenities such as public transportation, supermarkets, and pharmacies. Examine the condition of the walls and floors for cracks and document them. Test all utilities, windows, and doors. Inquire about the heating system and proper ventilation techniques to prevent mold.

Reviewing the rental contract:

- Thoroughly read and understand the rental contract. Pay attention to specifics such as the security deposit, termination conditions and responsibilities. Clarify any uncertainties with the landlord. → **Attention: Documents will always be in German!**

Seeking help if needed:

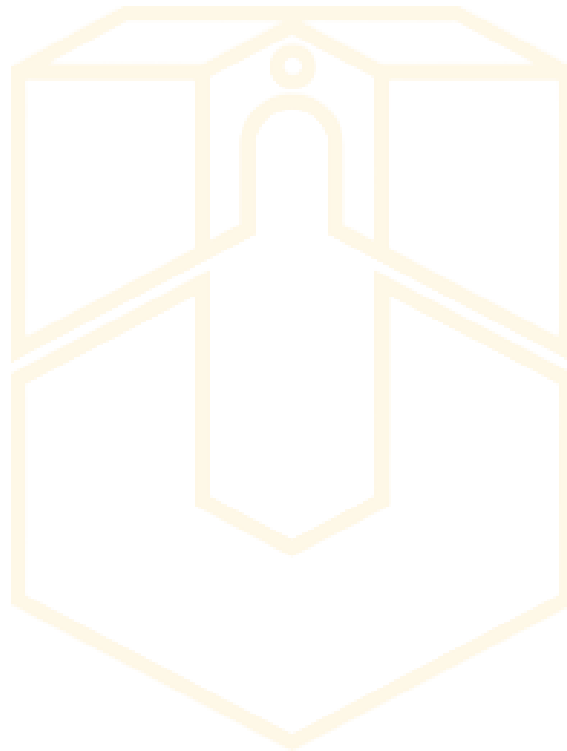
- If your search proves difficult, reach out to your university's AStA (student association) or International Office. AStA may provide temporary accommodations and information on housing resources.

Remember, finding accommodation in Germany requires patience and thorough research. Be proactive, prepared, and open to various housing options to increase your chances of success.

Search for accommodation - Scam Alert

- Please be aware of possible scams while searching for accommodation in Germany.
- Be cautious of any room rental offers where the owner is not currently residing in Germany. These are often scams and should be approached with caution.
- If you receive a response to an accommodation search posted on eBay or other sites and the landlord claims to arrange a viewing through TripAdvisor, Airbnb, or any other similar service, be aware that this is not a legitimate service offered by these companies.
- Before signing a contract, always insist on viewing the apartment either in person or through a video call. **Do not pay any deposit beforehand.**

Enroll in University

The process of enrolling at Osnabrueck University typically involves the following steps (although they may vary depending on the student).

After submission of all required documents to the university as they mention in the admission letter & payment of the tuition fee, you will receive an email with all the necessary information to log in to StudIP, which is a software platform used to register for courses and access university-related information.

- Note that: **This account will be activated after 24 hours.**
- Contact: Students Office (studentsoffice@uos.de)

- Upload your photo on StudIP when you receive your StudIP account (instructions are given in the email).
- When you arrive in Osnabrück, visit Building 19 as soon as possible to obtain your student card.
- As long as students are enrolled at Osnabrück University, you can get the digital travel ticket via the following link: <https://abo.ride-ticketing.de/app/login?partnerId=995d7ff66ac04891d136f6221532a265>
With this ticket, you can use most of the public transportation around Germany for free.

(The university enrollment is completed after paying the tuition fee.)

* Pay tuition fee for the first semester

- Option 1: Go to the bank in your country and send the money to Osnabrueck Uni's account (be aware of possible charges of your bank for international transfers).
- Option 2: Ask a friend in Germany to pay for you first, then pay back the money when you come to Germany.
- If you have any issues when transferring your money to the University's bank account (for example: wrong reason for payment, you can send an email to: **studierendensekretariat@uni-osnabrueck.de**)

Register for the German courses and other languages courses

Register for a German course (Completely free for students of the University)

Entering Germany with a Visa

In order to register in the city of Osnabrück, you will have to make an appointment at the Bürgeramt. Please use the following link to access the online appointment system:

Please make sure to have the following documents with you:

- Accommodation provider confirmation
- Copy of a valid passport (all pages containing content, e.g. stamps, etc.)

You will receive your registration confirmation straight after the appointment. The confirmation is needed to open a bank account.

If your visa expires before the end of your stay, you will also have to apply for a residence permit. The following documents are required:

- Biometric passport photo (can be taken at the Foreigner's Office)
- Proof of health insurance
- Enrollment certificate
- Proof of sufficient funding (e.g. bank statements, blocked account, proof of scholarship, declaration of commitment or similar)
- Fee 100€ (free of charge for holders of a German scholarship; in this case, please submit corresponding proof)

Note:

- At the beginning of each semester, both Osnabrück University of Applied Sciences and Osnabrück University organise a group appointment for new international students who have entered Germany without a visa or with a short-term visa in cooperation with the Foreigners' Office. We strongly recommend that you attend this appointment to complete your registration formalities! Dates will be published on both universities' websites in advance.
- In case you cannot attend the group appointment, you will have to make an individual appointment with the foreigners' office. Please send an e-mail containing your full name, date of birth, and purpose of your request to abh@osnabrueck.de. Please note: It may take some time to obtain an individual appointment .

Insurance

As a student in Germany you must have your public health insurance for enrollment. Without the confirmation of public health insurance, studies are not possible. The insurance company will submit this directly to the university.

→ Important for Exchange Students from the European Union: Students from EU countries, who are already insured in their home country, do not have to be insured in Germany. You can directly go to see the doctor with your European-Health-Insurance-Card (EHIC). Please send a copy of your valid EHIC to a public insurance provider.

You can check the insurance below to decide which one is most suitable for you.

Public Insurances:

Private Insurances:

- Students who are older than 30: If you are not a member of the EU, you are not able to get into German Public-Insurance.
- For students above 30 years: After you buy the private insurance, you will need to send an email to a public insurance provider such as TK or AOK, **requesting them to issue an exemption from mandatory health insurance and send a notification to the university regarding your exemption from German statutory health insurance.**
- Note: If you choose private insurance, it's important to note that you will not be able to switch back to a public health insurance. While public insurance may be more expensive, it provides coverage for a wider range of medical services, including accidents and severe diseases. On the other hand, public insurances do not offer coverage for certain luxury services such as laser treatments, botox, fillers, and similar procedures.

What kind of public transport am I allowed to take with my semester ticket?

- Your semester ticket allows you to use the following modes of transportation:
- All buses in all cities and districts in Germany.
- All local trains operated by Regional-Express (RE) and Regionalbahn (RB). Please note that IC/EC/ICE/FLX trains are not covered.

Bank Account- General information

In order to open a bank account, it is mandatory to register at your place of residence first. In Osnabrück, Bürgeramt (citizen's office) is the authority in charge of registrations. You cannot open a bank account without the registration confirmation (Meldebescheinigung).

- You can open bank accounts with online banks or on site banks such as Volksbank or Sparkasse. However, you will need to make an appointment first, either by telephone, personally or through online appointment systems.
- Please note that most banks require that you bring somebody to translate should you not have German skills.
- Necessary documents:
 1. Passport
 2. Certificate of enrollment (Immatrikulationsbescheinigung)
 3. Meldebescheinigung
 4. Tax ID (if already available)

Note:

- After receiving the bank account documents, please keep these documents safe! It's very important!
- Your bank card will be ready in about one week after the account opening process. You can choose to pick up your card yourself or leave your address for them to send it to you.
- After the process, you can deposit money into your account.
- Several common banks: Sparkasse, Commerzbank, Deutsche Bank, Volksbank
- Banks will ask for your German tax ID, if you haven't received it yet, tell them that you will hand it in later.
